Community Resource Center (CRC)'s mission is to help our neighbors create paths to healthy food, stable homes and safe relationships.

Founded in 1979, CRC delivers compassionate emergency assistance, case management, counseling, shelter, food support, and vital resources to economically vulnerable individuals and families—including survivors of domestic violence and those facing or at risk of homelessness. With offices in Encinitas, Carlsbad and San Marcos, CRC serves coastal North County San Diego and impacts over 8,600 lives each year.





Service Area:

Our team is dedicated to helping people achieve their housing and financial stability goals, providing personalized support for those experiencing or at risk of homelessness. We offer personalized case management to help participants secure long-term stability, along with stabilization services such as benefits enrollment, transportation and utility assistance, employment readiness, and financial literacy. Our homelessness prevention and intervention programs provide emergency shelter, rapid re-housing, and rental assistance to support those in need.

"It's getting better every day. I wake up happy every morning."

My name is Janet. If not for Community Resource Center and my case manager, Ashley, who knows where I would be. I'm 71 and have major health problems and without CRC I wouldn't have been able to make it much longer on the streets.

CRC has been a lifesaver. Ashley has been there every step of the way for me. I'm so grateful to her. She made sure I had everything I need, a bed to sleep in, who could ask for more. I've gained some weight, have a comfortable place to stay and someone who truly cares about me and I can confide in. It's getting better every day. I wake up happy every morning.

I'm not an alcoholic or drug addict. I just have medical problems and I'm old. CRC helps a lot of people. If it wasn't for Ashley and Community Resource Center I don't know where I would be. I was at my limit when she found the place for me. It means the world to me."

Holiday Baskets

CRC’s Holiday Baskets program has been spreading joy and hope for 42 years, providing relief to households facing financial stress during the holiday season. Thanks to the generosity of our compassionate community, families can celebrate the season while focusing on essential needs like rent and utilities. In 2024, the 42nd Annual Holiday Baskets program included:

- **Holiday Shopping Experience:** A “dignity of choice” opportunity for CRC clients to select gifts and essentials for their families.
- **Holiday Backpacks Program:** Backpacks to fill with necessities and comfort items for unsheltered individuals, and coffee and breakfast items served by caring volunteers.
- **Senior Gifts:** Thoughtful packages delivered to bring care and joy to local seniors.

Food & Nutrition Services

CRC's client-choice Food & Nutrition Center provides healthy food and nutrition education to individuals and families facing hunger or food insecurity. We believe in the dignity of choice—allowing clients to select the fresh, healthy items that make sense for their families. Serving more than 600 participants each month, including families, seniors and people experiencing homelessness, our Food & Nutrition Center is powered by rescued produce, community food drives and generous gifts. Households receive an average economic benefit of \$450 per month—freeing up scarce dollars for rent, utilities, transportation or medicine and helping to prevent homelessness.

Greg's Pathway to a Stable Home

"I've made it to my new home."

After experiencing homelessness for four years, mostly living out of his car, Greg reached out to CRC for support in finding stable housing. In April 2024, Greg connected with CRC's Rapid Rehousing program and began collaborating with his case manager to find a place to live in Oceanside—a community where he felt at home and could continue seeing his trusted doctors. Despite facing barriers including partial blindness and navigating a lengthy SSI application process, Greg never lost hope.

With a past eviction and poor credit history, finding traditional housing proved to be difficult. **But Greg wouldn't give up and explored creative solutions with his CRC case manager, Kim.** Together, they found that shared housing could be the answer. Greg identified his priorities and needs, and CRC supported him in finding a welcoming shared housing arrangement.

This new living situation brought more than just a roof over Greg's head—it provided community and stability. The location allowed Greg to stay close to his doctors, while also being within walking distance to a bus stop and grocery stores. **Now, Greg is able to focus on his health, well-being and building financial stability for the future.**

Grateful for the support and a safe place to call home, Greg shared this with his case manager:

"I've made it to my new home. Thank you for everything you are doing for me. Thank you from the bottom of my heart. I am so grateful for your time and all your help. You are like a guardian angel."

Domestic Violence Services

Survivors of domestic violence find safety, healing, and a path to stability through CRC's emergency shelter, housing programs, counseling, and supportive services. In 2024, 82 individuals (30 households) found refuge in our emergency shelter, receiving the care and resources needed to rebuild their lives. Our Therapeutic Children's Center provided a safe, nurturing space for 52 children, with 371 visits offering trauma-informed support. Through our 24-hour hotline, CRC responded to 3,042 calls, connecting survivors to critical, life-saving assistance. Additionally, 3,987 individuals benefited from prevention education and resources, helping to break the cycle of abuse and build safer communities.

Amina's Pathway to Safety

“Amina was crying tears of joy ...”

Amina and her three children found safety and hope at Community Resource Center's emergency shelter after escaping a life-threatening situation. Amina's abuser was threatening and stalking her after being released from prison, and the family had to flee their home.

At CRC, Amina's family obtained safe shelter, healthy food, counseling. CRC became a safe haven for her family, offering not only protection but also the critical resources they needed to begin rebuilding their lives. During their time at CRC, Amina's two youngest children spent their days in our Therapeutic Childcare Center, where they thrived in a nurturing environment, while her eldest child excelled in school. To support her family, Amina secured a job making deliveries, which allowed her to care for her children while working. Amina soon moved into CRC's Transitional Housing program and her family was able to move into a safe apartment.

The moment Amina and her children stepped into their new home was unforgettable. “Amina was crying tears of joy,” shared a CRC program manager. “She was so grateful, and her children were squealing in delight as they saw their new home filled with special gifts just for them.” These thoughtful gifts, provided by CRC's generous volunteers, made the apartment feel like a true home. With the help of CRC's resale stores, **Amina was also able to transform** her new space into a warm, welcoming environment for her family, choosing items that made her home her own.

Today, Amina and her children are safe, surrounded by love and support, and looking ahead to a brighter future.

Highlights of Community Support

Exposure Skate Raises Awareness & Support

We are grateful to Exposure Skate for their 13 years of commitment to supporting survivors of domestic violence. Held on November 2-3, 2024, Exposure's annual skateboarding competition for women and nonbinary skaters raised \$6,000 in support of CRC's domestic violence programs.





Amplifying Awareness

Hunger, homelessness and domestic violence are persistent challenges in our community, so we raise awareness year-round to keep these issues visible, mobilize volunteers and partners, and drive the sustained support needed to create lasting change. A few highlights from 2024 include:

Interview on Salud California: CRC’s Domestic Violence Education & Prevention Manager, Luis Canseco, joined KSDY50 to discuss our mission and programs that educate and empower individuals and families to prevent abuse.

Spotlight in North County Informador: Luis Canseco and our Bilingual Mental Health Clinician, Adriana Naranjo, shared strategies for preventing domestic violence and breaking mental-health stigma in the Latino community.

“My Intimate Partner” Exhibition at the Oceanside Museum of Art: This powerful exhibit showcased artwork embodying the resilience and strength of domestic violence survivors. Curator Smadar Samson collaborated with CRC’s counseling team to weave survivors’ own quotes throughout the gallery, tracing their journeys from hardship to healing.



Awareness Year-Round:

January: We All Count homelessness census—mobilizing volunteers to ensure every unsheltered neighbor is counted.

February: Teen Dating Violence Awareness Month—wearing orange to promote safe, healthy relationships and educate teens to stop the cycle before it begins.

May: Mental Health Month and participation in the Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive.

September: Hunger Action Month—raising awareness of food insecurity by wearing orange, organizing food drives and more.

October: Domestic Violence Awareness Month—wearing purple to honor survivors and hosting awareness events.

- New entry foyers offering privacy and shelter
- Dedicated restrooms for client comfort



Please note: The above financials and our Form 990 include our capital campaign. Administrative and fundraising expenses exceed historical averages due to temporary professionally contracted services, including architectural and construction management, associated with the campaign. Excluding capital campaign expenses, 77% of funds go toward program services, with 23% allocated to administrative and fundraising costs.

Financial information shown is for the 2024 fiscal year, July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024. Resale store donations are per audited financial statements and are valued at actual amount realized on sale. Valuable donated items, such as jewelry or artwork, with a readily determinable fair market value are recorded at their appraised value or the value based on prices of identical or similar assets in the marketplace. The value of food donations is estimated per pound based on cost studies.
