This addition to our repertoire of services highlights our dedication to fostering holistic well-being and resilience among everyone we serve.

CRC reached just over 90% of the \$10.5 million One Community • One Heart capital campaign goal, and also expanded with new service centers in the neighboring cities of Carlsbad and San Marcos, along with new programs in Solana Beach. This expansion makes CRC's services more accessible to our neighbors in need and underscores our vision of creating socially just and equitable communities across our region.

Together, we have made a tangible difference in the lives of countless individuals and families. I'm confident that our continued collaboration will realize greater impact in the years to come.

Community Resource Center (CRC)'s mission is to help our neighbors create paths to healthy food, stable homes and safe relationships.

Founded in 1979, CRC provides emergency assistance, case management, counseling, shelter, food assistance and resources to low-income individuals and families who are economically vulnerable, experiencing homelessness or at imminent risk of homelessness, including domestic violence survivors.

CRC is the primary provider of social services and domestic violence programs in coastal North County San Diego, serving more than 7,200 individuals each year without regard to race, religion, gender identity, sexual orientation, ethnicity, age or immigration status.


WHO WE SERVE

85% of CRC participants are from North County, including 79% from our primary service area of Coastal North County.

15% of CRC participants are from East, Central and South County.

Our domestic violence shelter serves as a secure refuge for individuals and families who relocate to find safety with us.

1 in 10 San Diego County residents live in poverty

11% of San Diego County residents – or 335,000 people – live below the federal poverty line due to a lack of self-sufficient wages and the high cost of housing, utilities, transportation and food in the region.

Homelessness

10,264

People are experiencing homelessness in San Diego County.

San Diego Regional Task Force of Homelessness 2023 WeAllCount Region Totals

Volunteers joined CRC on January 11, 2023 at 4:00 a.m. for the **WeAllCount Point-in-Time Count**, capturing a snapshot of homelessness in our region. The count found that approximately 10,264 individuals were experiencing homelessness across San Diego County, an increase of 22% over 2022. The data also revealed a 10% reduction in homelessness in Carlsbad, Encinitas, and Oceanside, showcasing the impact when cities and nonprofits work together.

This initiative, led by the Regional Task Force on Homelessness, helps assess homelessness and help those in need of shelter. The numbers remind us of the urgent need to provide comprehensive support for our unsheltered neighbors.

GROWING OUR IMPACT IN NORTH COUNTY

We've expanded our programs across North County, providing compassionate and comprehensive support to meet the evolving needs of our community.

New Trauma Recovery Center

Removing barriers to care and transforming services for survivors of violent crime.

Located in Carlsbad, the CRC Trauma Recovery Center offers comprehensive care to those impacted by trauma, including domestic violence, sexual assault, and community violence. Our services encompass outreach, clinical case management, traumainformed psychotherapy, medication management, and evidence-based treatments, supporting a wide range of needs for survivors and individuals facing mental health and substance use challenges. Funding from the California Victim Compensation Board has made this vital resource possible.

Dual Diagnosis Clinician

Addressing the complex needs of those at risk of homelessness, our new Dual Diagnosis Clinician offers vital support for individuals with co-occurring mental illness and substance use disorders. This role includes crisis intervention, individual counseling, and peer support groups focused on mental health and substance use. This position was made possible with funding from the Lucky Duck Foundation and Greathouse Family Foundation.

Homelessness Prevention and Intervention in Solana Beach

With support from a grant by the Solana Beach Fund at Coastal Community Foundation, CRC provided critical housing assistance to 41 economically vulnerable residents in Solana Beach who were affected by local redevelopment. This assistance included deposit and rental support, utility aid, and moving help, ensuring stable relocations and preventing homelessness.

Enhanced Employment and Benefits Assistance

In Carlsbad, our Employment and Benefits Specialist is making strides in helping residents stabilize and build their income through access to government aid programs and resources for employment, training, and education.

Domestic Violence Housing Coordinator

A crucial new role, the Domestic Violence Housing Coordinator is expanding our transitional housing efforts by facilitating community outreach, enhancing access to housing options, and serving as a liaison with landlords to secure accommodations for survivors of domestic violence.

FOOD RESCUE

No one should have to worry about where their next meal is coming from.

For 45 years, Community Resource Center has provided food and resources to those in our community who are experiencing food insecurity. CRC's Food Rescue Initiative turns surplus into sustenance, partnering to deliver nutritious, rescued food directly to those in need at our pantry.

> Our Food & Nutrition Center distributes over 505.000 pounds of rescued food annually, an essential resource for an average of 570 monthly participants, including families, seniors and individuals experiencing homelessness.

STABLE HOMES

Our team is dedicated to helping people achieve their housing and financial stability goals and providing personalized support for those experiencing or at risk of homelessness.



We provide:

- **Case Management:** Individualized support to assist participants toward security and stability
- **Stabilization Services:** Benefits enrollment assistance, transportation and utilities assistance, employment readiness assistance, financial literacy training, budgeting
- Homelessness Prevention and Intervention: Seasonal shelter and emergency housing assistance, Rapid Re-housing, deposit/rental assistance





DONNA'S STORY

Donna's journey began after experiencing traumatic abuse and leaving home, moving from motels to safe parking programs. As a senior living with a brain condition and disability, Donna came to CRC for help finding stability. Her life changed when she found a compassionate team that supported her every step of the way. From emergency food to rental assistance, CRC was there for her. Donna also received basic needs from CRC's resale stores, and gifts and food at Holiday Baskets.

PAULA'S STORY

Through counseling with CRC's Dual Diagnosis Clinician and participation in our domestic violence support group, Paula transformed from surviving to thriving. She addressed her past coping mechanisms, ended an abusive relationship, and processed her grief over the loss of her late husband. She also recognized patterns of avoidance and self-sacrifice, learning to establish boundaries that protect and support her. Most importantly, Paula discovered her self-worth and is now determined to support others facing similar challenges, eager to "pass on the healing and learning."

HOLIDAY BASKETS

Bringing help and hope to hundreds facing hardship in our community.

With the help of volunteers and donors, our 41st Holiday Baskets brought help and hope to hundreds facing hardship. During Holiday Baskets, households in need had the opportunity to select essential items they needed most—from food and gifts for their children to household necessities. They also received a voucher for gently-used items at our resale stores, a new blanket, and fresh produce.

Unsheltered clients received backpacks filled with basic living essentials and food items, while seniors received gift bags with items specially selected for them.

Holiday Baskets helped low-income households have a wonderful holiday experience and gave households some economic breathing room, so scarce dollars could be spent on other needs such as rent, utilities or transportation.

CRC volunteers are deeply committed to our mission and give their time to improve the lives of neighbors in need.

In 2023, 931 volunteers were instrumental to supporting CRC's programs and outreach in the community. An incredible 70 volunteers donated over 100 hours each last year! It was an exciting year for the CRC Volunteer Program, marked by significant new initiatives and expanded opportunities. We launched our first-ever Youth Advisory Board, enhanced our volunteer involvement by introducing more group opportunities and expanded our Truck Driver Assistants program.




